The Hong Kong Virtuoso Chorus Limited (HKVC) was founded in 2011 as a youth choir, utilising proceeds from musical performances to support educational initiatives and community causes.

As the organisation evolved, HKVC attained s.88 charitable status, marking a milestone in its commitment to serving the community. Notably, since 2018, HKVC has organised the Hong Kong Inter-School Choral Festival (HKICF) on an annual basis, now serving over 25,000 participants annually. This festival has become a cornerstone event of HKVC, offering valuable learning and performance opportunities to student choristers and educators in Hong Kong through choral competitions, masterclasses, workshops, and concerts.

In addition to its flagship festival HKICF, HKVC has introduced other innovative programmes such as the School Choir Advancement Programme and Overseas Music Exchange Programme to broaden access to music education.



STATUS QUO 1:

ACADEMIC PRESSURE AND COMPETITIVE CULTURE



IS MUSIC EDUCATION MEANT TO BE UTILITARIAN?

In Hong Kong, despite the Education Bureau's initiatives to underscore the comprehensive benefits of music education, such as fostering aesthetic sensitivity, creative thinking, flexibility, and intellectual and moral development [1]*, the prevailing perspective on music education continues to focus on enhancing students' academic credentials [2]. A study on 1,493 music learners in Hong Kong aged 12-18 echoes the above, revealing that parents in general pay much more attention to learners' accreditation than their performance [3]. Their support on kids' music development also drops significantly once these teenagers hit academic bottlenecks (ibid).

Except for classroom music lessons, music education for Hong Kong students occurs mostly through private tutoring, and is often centred around examination and competition preparation. Recent data from the Hong Kong Examinations and Assessment Authority (HKEAA) reveals that in 2020 alone, the authority administered 55,000 music, dance, and arts-related examinations, with the ABRSM exam as the most prevalent choice [4]. To contextualise this statistic, there were only 45,257 HKDSE school candidates during the same year [5]. Notably, ABRSM represents just one of the popular music examination boards in the region.


IS MUSIC EDUCATION MEANT TO BE COMPETITIVE?

The prevailing emphasis on acquiring prestigious certifications, often times contrary to students' genuine interests, compels young music learners in Hong Kong to approach music mechanically, leading to a gradual erosion of their intrinsic motivation. Even those who excel in music "academically" may develop a distaste for music, while the average learners, comprising the majority, experience diminished self-esteem due to delays in achieving these coveted accolades.

In addition to that, the competitive mindset has also engendered an unhealthy environment within inter-school music programmes. Conventional interschool music competitions have transitioned from platforms for mutual learning and appreciation to arenas for school performance comparisons. The pursuit of championship titles has eclipsed the acknowledgment of individual efforts and progress, further dampening the enthusiasm of music learners and educators alike and veering away from the fundamental purpose of music education.

STATUS QUO 2:

LIMITED ACCESS TO MUSIC EDUCATION IN LESS PRIVILEGED SCHOOLS AND FAMILIES



DO WE HAVE ENOUGH RECOGNITION OF (AND THUS RESOURCES DEVOTED TO) MUSIC EDUCATION?

In our work to promote music education, we noted a significant challenge hindering students in less privileged schools. These students often face financial barriers that prevent them from participating in private instrumental or vocal classes and accessing quality music instruction. The high fees charged by music tutors in Hong Kong further exacerbate this issue, making it difficult for students from lower-income families to pursue their musical interests.

Moreover, many schools struggle to invest in their own music programmes due partly to the relatively little awareness and support from parents who may not recognise the value of music education. In a global journal on music education, Prof. Bo Wah Leung from EdUHK described the situation in Hong Kong as "very few stakeholders appreciate the value and functions of music learning; many of them consider that music lessons are for students' relaxation rather than learning and as being important for the whole person's development." [6]. This lack of investment results in difficulties forming choral (and instrumental) ensembles or building teacher-artist partnership at school, a mechanism that has shown significant educational impact to students [7].


DO WE HAVE A SUPPORTIVE ENVIRONMENT FOR MUSIC EDUCATORS?

Given that classroom music lessons are the primary avenue for music education in less privileged schools, the shortage of professionally-trained music teachers is concerning. Many teachers (particularly those in primary schools) responsible for music classes are core academic subject educators with limited music background, which directly affects the quality of music education provided to students. At the same time, school teachers in government and aided schools are often heavily occupied with administrative work that continuing professional development in music may be impractical (ibid).

These highlight the urgent need for greater support and investment in music education to create a more inclusive and equitable learning environment for all students to explore and nurture their musical talents.

THE RESULT:

LOSING GROUND TO GLOBAL PEERS IN GROOMING OUR NEXT GENERATION



As a result of the problems articulated above, we are witnessing a concerning trend of Hong Kong trailing behind our global counterparts in nurturing the next generation through music education, despite conscientious efforts of our government. While countries like Singapore and the United Kingdom are prioritising music in their national curricula and reaping the benefits, we seem to be lagging behind.

SINGAPORE

Singapore's Ministry of Education has embraced music education as a catalyst for critical thinking, communication skills, and cultural literacy. Under the latest framework for 21st Century Competencies and Student Outcomes, Singapore has highlighted competencies such as critical, adaptive, and inventive thinking, communication, collaboration, and civic literacy [8]. Recognising the strong correlation between music education and these competencies, the Ministry of Education reformed the music education syllabus in 2022 to emphasise experiential learning, critical thinking, and student empowerment [9]. As part of its action plan, Singapore aims to introduce performing arts-based learning to all secondary schools by 2027 [10].

UNITED KINGDOM

Similarly, the United Kingdom's commitment to music education is evident through its efforts to improve accessibility and inclusivity. The Government, in partnership with Arts Council England and ABRSM, developed a 10-year Vision for UK's music learning with the main theme of supporting every young person, regardless of background, to realise their full musical potential [11]. The Department for Education refreshed the national plan for music education in 2022 [12] and established Music Education Hubs to provide tailored support to schools, local authorities, and the community, including early years children, students with special educational needs, and homeschooling [13].

RESULTS OF ON-GOING RESEARCH


These reforms on music education in Singapore and the UK align with global studies on its benefits for youth beyond musicianship. Kokkidou concluded that music education's open learning nature and multiple manifestations of expression foster critical thinking and cognitive performance in students [14]. In a systematic literature review, Blasco-Magraner et al. summarised that music education improves emotional regulation, increases empathy, and promotes the development of social skills [15]. Ilari et al. suggested that songs, incorporating music and language, enrich enculturation and socialisation in education, with benefits for crosscultural understanding of songs from different cultures taught [16].

THIS IS WHY WE ACT

As we witness these global advancements in music education, we are inspired to take action. Recognising the pressing need to bridge the gap in music education in our city, we are committed to leveraging the power of choral music education to create a more vibrant and inclusive learning environment for our youth.

With a firm belief in the transformative power of music, we are dedicated to nurturing a new generation of confident, creative, and culturally aware individuals through our choral programmes. Together, let us work towards a future where every child in Hong Kong has the opportunity to experience the joy and benefits of choral music education.

SCHOOL CHOIR INCUBATOR PROGRAMME

Launched in 2021, this year-long train-the-trainers programme offers professional training and mentorship for music teachers and conductors to enhance their effectiveness in leading their school choirs. The programme also provides performance opportunities for the participating school choirs, as well as comprehensive support for schools without existing choirs to establish one.



OUR IMPACT STORIES

BRONSON LAU,

an alumnus from the first cohort of the Hong Kong Inter-School Choir pursuing music education in university

Bronson loved singing since childhood despite coming from a family with modest means. He was active in choir until F.4 when he had to stop due to school restrictions. Unable to afford private choirs, he paused for a year until his teacher encouraged him to audition for the then newly formed Hong Kong Inter-School Choir (HKISC).

HKISC was certainly a unique experience for Bronson. "HKISC is a more open choral environment, with more interactive music making. I have befriended students from Tuen Mun, Tseung Kwan O, Hong Kong Island..., folks I could never have met otherwise".

Together with 50 choristers, the 1st HKISC secondary division performed many global choral pieces, acted on stage in a professionally-directed Cantonese musical "Like, So?", and founded the student-run HKISC Instagram. "One time after a show, we were so excited and wanted to record our precious moments together, so we made an Instagram page dedicated to this." The baton of the HKISC Instagram has now passed,



yet the friendship remains. "We still meet regularly every couple of months, sharing and supporting each other in our music endeavours."

Bronson's involvement with HKVC did not stop in his DSE year. He helped as a volunteer. "It's a fun experience witnessing the 2nd HKISC's performance as organiser.

It is when you once again experience the initial touching moment that drives you to devote yourself to music." These front-row-seat opportunities inspired Bronson's passion to be a music teacher. "I do hope to join the teachers' choir soon!" Now, as a freshman in EdUHK Music Department, his new journey has just begun.

Bronson's involvement with HKISC has profoundly impacted his music journey and career aspirations, providing him with invaluable experiences and connections that continue to shape his future in music.

HOW PARENTS THINK ABOUT THE HONG KONG INTER-SCHOOL CHOIR?



We have also interviewed a couple of parents from the Hong Kong Inter-School Choir (HKISC), and they have found different benefits through the 241-hour music journey:

Lau Chun Hei is a P.5 student from The Church of Christ in China Kei Tsun Primary School. A football lover and a mischievous type in the choir. With HKISC being his only regular music exposure, he loved it so much that he attended all activities and rehearsals and was awarded the best attendance prize for HKISC 2024.

Through this year-long journey of music-making with 60+ peer choir members, Chun Hei has transformed from an arrogant brat to a team player working well with others to reach a better outcome. "You can sense his self-confidence and comfort from within, in any group setting," said his mother.

Through music, Chun Hei experienced firsthand how thoughts and emotions can be communicated, and this has in turn helped him express his feelings with others. "I feel Chun Hei shares more about how he feels nowadays" His mother smiled with relief. Wan Pak Kiu from PLK Tin Ka Ping Millennium Primary School built his perseverance and proactivity from HKISC. "Knowing that there are HKISC rehearsals every Wednesday, Pak Kiu starts working on his homework ahead of time during breaks at school," added his mother. Pak Kiu also treasured so much the new inter-school friendships that he prepared gifts for everyone at the last HKISC activity of the year.

Devasri Ramachandran is of Indian descent, and she studies in Po Leung Kuk Lam Man Chan English Primary School.

At first, she and her parents were concerned about the inter-school environment, where the majority of the choir members are Cantonese speakers. Yet the power of music has bridged the language gap. She met buddies who were willing to help her out in times when Cantonese translation is needed, and other friends who are not as fluent in English are nevertheless equally welcoming to her.

She gained exposure to Chinese songs and learned the beauty of the Cantonese language through HKISC's training. "Now she is interested in learning more Cantonese," said her mother proudly.

PRIMARY SCHOOL TEACHER: MS. JOYCE LEUNG

(TWGHs Wong See Sum Primary School)



SECONDARY SCHOOL TEACHER: MS. LYDIA SHEUNG (Precious Blood Secondary School)



Ms. Leung from TWGHs Wong See Sum Primary School decided to establish a school choir from scratch in 2018, hoping to promote music exposure to students from low-income families. "To these students, school choir is the most accessible, and in many cases the only, avenue to the world of music." She saw the transformation of students participating in this three-year journey as choir members from P3 - P6. "It is interesting to see how choir members grow their individual potential here. Leaders of the group do not have to be the best singers. The variety of roles in a choir such as soloists. MCs. and choirmasters ensure students of different strengths find their niche and grow together."

Co-creation is a unique benefit of choral activities, Ms. Leung highlighted. "Each performance is like a challenge, to get it through, everyone, including also the conductor and accompanist, has to listen to each other and make adjustments. This ultimately creates the harmony in music the choir must have. **Such collaboration is rare**

in a classroom or other extra-curricular activities in primary schools."

Participating in HKICF's programmes inspired Ms. Leung to springboard her choir's growth. "I have been a music educator for quite some years, yet I am still amazed at how effective peer observational learning can be". Ms. Leung first joined HKICF's Competition cum Masterclass in 2020, where she had her first experience spectating peer choirs' coaching by overseas adjudicators. She has been active in HKICF's educational workshops since then. "It was tough to find professional development opportunities in the past before HKICF."

A choir is arguably the most costeffective way to bring music education to a sizable group as one conductor and one accompanist can serve 60 or more students at a time. By springboarding beginning choirs on a sustainable track, Ms. Leung is hopeful that she will see more transformation of students' lives through music. Ms. Sheung from Precious Blood Secondary School has been a seasoned choral conductor for two decades. "I was an English major who played some piano. When our music teachers retired and the school choir was about to disband. I just felt so bad that our students would lose the opportunity to sing in a choir. To some students, that was their only chance to explore music and art. Therefore, I decided to take up running the choir without much choral knowledge."

After the initial couple of more challenging years, the school choir has been running well. Yet the choir hit a bottleneck in recent years. "I felt like the traditional way of choral music coaching was less effective to our girls nowadays." Ms. Sheung found a gradual drop in participation in the choir, especially post-COVID, and had run out of ideas to energise the choir. "I was desperate for inspiration and often felt alone in this journey of choral music education."

Ms. Sheung started participating in HKICF programmes in 2021. "The Incubator programme has been very helpful. This year

we have Mr. Chris Cheng as our mentor, who has not just brought in his own choral expertise, but also his whole choir from St. Joseph's College." Through the spark from this collaboration, Precious Blood Secondary School and St. Joseph's College have formed a mixed choir to perform together.

Ms. Sheung has also met peer music educators from the HKICF Teachers' Choir. "It is great to know like-minded peers who share similar difficulties. We have learnt a lot from each other and life just seems easier knowing that you have company."

"The pursuit of art is always tough. You will never be perfect, yet your attempt to identify the beauty, to internalise it, then strive for this vision, is what matters in the end."

Educators play a critical role in the long-term development of music education in Hong Kong. With the support of music teachers through our programmes, Ms. Sheung could go through the journey of choral music education resourcefully.



Our income comes primarily from government funding (56.11%) and family charitable foundations (15.07%). These funds are granted on a year-to-year basis. This significantly limits the organisation's long-term planning and flexibility. Moreover, most of these grants are restricted to funding specific HKICF projects. As a result, we must rely on other unrestricted donations for operational expenses like office rent. To improve financial stability and to build reserves, we aim to increase unrestricted income to at least 50%, targeting an additional \$2.5 million annually.

EXPENDITURE BREAKDOWN FOR THE ORGANISATION





However, most of the funding we receive is restricted to project-related expenses, which means that we cannot allocate these funds to cover essential overhead costs such as office rentals, staff salaries, and administrative expenses. Additionally, the funds we receive from the government and family foundations are subject to annual approvals and may not continue. Together, we can ensure that our initiatives remain sustainable and impactful.
